

# **Student Reflection:** SANTOS Science Experience @ The University of Adelaide

From Tuesday 7 to Thursday 9 December 2021, we attended the SANTOS Science Experience, a scientific experience for Year 9 and 10 students, at the University of Adelaide. The SANTOS Science experience opened with a presentation from Richard Harvey, a scientist and MP for Newland. He spoke to us about science and politics and how his participation in this experience 22 years ago led him to pursue his current career. Following this, we were taken on a tour of the campus and participated in hands-on tutorials held in some of the university's science laboratories.

On the second day, we travelled by bus to the University of Adelaide Roseworthy Campus, where most of the veterinary science courses are located. We checked the health of a Jack Russell and of some horses. We tested veterinary heart monitors on each other and learnt how to correctly apply them so that we could measure and graph our heart data on complex simulators. This activity gave us an opportunity to participate in, and complete an actual task carried out by university veterinary students.

On the third day, we remained at the city campus and participated in activities such as playing games which involved the use of mathematics and logical reasoning skills, DNA extraction, and carried out a number of activities which involved the use of sound waves.

The experience was a great opportunity for us to discover and explore different fields of science and to meet other young people with similar interests in science and STEM related careers. Overall, we would definitely recommend this experience to any Year 9 or 10 students who want to learn more about science and the careers that stem from a study of science at university. Finally, we would like to thank the Sunrise Rotary Club of Magill for sponsoring our attendance at this programme.




### Visual Arts

# Science @ MMC - SANTOS Science Experience @ Flinders University Josie Spizzo



Are you interested in science? The Santos Science Experience is just the opportunity for you!

At Mary Mackillop College, students are constantly taking part in activities that help broaden their knowledge, skillset and worldview. In December 2021, a group of four Year 9 students, consisting of Kahlea, Jaymie, Scarlett, and Reet, participated in The Santos Science Experience hosted at Flinders University.

The Santos Science experience is a fun filled 3-day annual event designed for students hoping to pursue a career in a scientific field or are simply interested in science. Throughout the programme, participants are under the guidance of an experienced scientist who enjoys their work and is dedicated to inspiring young people to consider pursuing studies in a field of science.

The following is an account of the girls' experience.

The Santos Science Experience gave us opportunities that challenged us and made us think about and better understand the science that plays a huge role in our everyday lives. We were offered a number of activities in a broad range of areas such as robotics, biomedical science, food science, chemistry and engineering. As much as we wanted to participate in all of the choices offered, we had to choose to focus on four of the areas offered. We were thoroughly intrigued by all the activities we were assigned and loved learning new things about science in our lives.

To make the challenge more interesting, we had quizzes at the end of each day. The Mary MacKillop College team ended up being runners-up in of a group of around 90 people! We were very proud of our efforts.

To provide participants with a feel of university life, different lectures were arranged. During these lectures, researchers presented their findings and helped us understand and learn more about different scientific careers, the physical and psychological importance of indoor plants and urban vegetation and scientific communication.

We were taught about the importance of developing abilities that can help communicate scientific ideas with others. To give us an idea of what this involved, we were divided into groups and asked to explain a modern scientific discovery to an imagined person living in the Renaissance period. Our group won the competition, and we were awarded with a pack of gummies! A bonus was the free lunch we received whilst being on campus.

Overall, the Santos Science Experience is something any scientifically inclined students will thoroughly enjoy. It is an opportunity that any Year 9 or 10 student should take advantage of when given the opportunity later in the year. We definitely plan to participate in the 2022 Santos Science Experience and we hope to see more MacKillop students joining us in early December.


