As we now eagerly await the release of the SACE results in December, we wish the Class of 2024 the best of luck for the future.



#### Visual Art

Congratulations to the 2024 Year 12 Visual Arts - Art and Design students and thank you to the families and friends who attended the exhibition opening on Friday 8 November. It was a privilege to celebrate the commitment of these students who dedicated so much time and effort to this subject. Hours of experimentation, planning and refinement were taken with great perseverance by Stage 2 Visual Art students to create an outstanding display of works.

Students recorded their ideas, inspiration and processes in their 40-page Folio through abundant journalling, media and concept experiments, photos and sketches exploring individual visions. They studied the styles, technologies and techniques of inspiring artists and designers related to their chosen themes and briefs, evaluating each problem then adapting and improving ideas visually until resolved to finally achieve their vision.

Concepts explored included the ageing process through family and self-portraits in Ella's realistic, 'Generations of Anna'. Barn Owls fly to safety away from a threatened habitat in Sophia's triptych 'Further to Fly'. These exquisite owls are depicted close to real, accomplished by her amazing talent and patience. Anna's definitive brand identity, advertising and merchandising for proposed anime and gaming convention 'Anima Con' is professional and 'event ready'. Her painstaking hours of work, years of accumulated digital knowledge, skill and imagination have been captured in her Folio leading to the polished result. Isabella created vivid, alternative poster designs for the College Arts Performance, Happily Ever After, inspired by her passion for famous musical posters as a part of her Creative Arts Project. 'Home is Where the Heart Is' represents Lily's reflections of family and memory through her many years of living in many homes. House shaped paintings exhibit her excellent painting skills with beautiful, symbolic artworks paying tribute to the family bonds that count. Isabelle's fashion design collection, photoshoot and garment for the 2025 MET GALA, 'Extragalactic: A Retrospective on Space and Fashion' is out of this world! She has taken inspiration from the history of space technology and combined the fashion aesthetics from each era to design a timeline of 'astronomical' garments. 'Copernicus' was the design constructed which reflects the Renaissance fashion style of the 1500-1600s. Renaissance mathematician and astronomer, Nicolaus Copernicus discovered the concept of 'heliocentrism', placing the sun rather than the earth at the centre of the universe and the planets moving around it. The planet's orbits are imaginatively shown in the crinoline (skirt structure) and headpiece. Sofia's clever game board design, 'Tales of Wonder' aims to capture the world of Hans Christian Andersen fairytales like 'The Princess and the Pea' and the 'Red Shoes' through 3d modelled and printed pieces, game cards and board creating a journey through storytelling.

An incredible show of originality, talent and skill, a show to remember!

The end of Term 4 has been a memorable experience for students in Drama and Dance, as rehearsed and polished performances have been presented to the class.



In Week 4 of this term, our Year 8 students attended a 3-day camp at Adare in Victor Harbor.

The Beach games afternoon was all about teamwork, friendly competition, and stepping outside their comfort zones.

Students were raised 15 metres above the ground by their fellow tribe members, experiencing G-force Superman Style motion. From all reports, it was a thrilling experience, and a great lesson in trusting themselves - and the people holding the ropes! This strange sensation was powered by tribe members, illustrating what can be accomplished when physics, teamwork and safety gear all combine.

Next, students took to the water for some canoeing down the Hindmarsh River. Some students showed they were naturals, gracefully paddling in sync, while others spent some time zigzagging rather than going straight. Other activities included brain twisters, challenge courses, survivor challenges and water obstacles. All of these activities reminded students that teamwork, good communication and the need to draw on each other's skills each play a part in creating their own success stories.

The highlight for many was the first night quiz where students were tested on their general knowledge. The second night students

participated in a Mission Impossible Challenge, hosted by our amazing Peer Support Leaders. The night ended with a fun egg and spoon race up and down the hill. This was quite the challenge. Our Peer Support Leaders did an incredible job of making our evening activities a success.

Year 8 camp isn't just about the activities (or being the winning tribe) - it is about stepping out of comfort zones, building confidence in themselves and their peers, strengthening connections, using grit and problem-solving skills and most importantly creating memories together.

### Careers News

Six Mary MacKillop College students were provided with the incredible opportunity to engage in experiential learning through an immersion experience, offered collaboratively by the Defence Science Technology Group (DSTG) and the Royal Australian Airforce (RAAF). During the five days, the students gained real-life experiences and exposure to post-school pathways in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM). The week was also instrumental in helping students align their future career aspirations with their subject interests and passions.

Initially, the group grumbled about the early 8:00 am starts, the long taxi rides to the north, and the late 5:00 pm finishes. However, this perspective quickly changed as we began to explore some of the leading innovators in emerging industries such as space, air, sea and cyber. A highlight of day 2 was visiting Southern Launch and learning about their two space launch facilities located here in South Australia. We were also provided with an overview of the range of job opportunities and the specific roles that people have like engineers, flight controllers, marketing, communications and a legal team who negotiate with regulatory bodies to gain all approval when launching missions into space. Next stop was The Australian Space Discovery Centre, where we learnt that space technologies like satellites support things that we all take for granted like Global Positioning Systems (GPS), telephone, internet communications and even our banking and retail experience is dependent on satellites that are orbiting out there in space.

Day 3, students travelled to BAE Systems at the Osborne Naval Shipyard to hear about the range of career opportunities (both functional and supporting) that are associated with the Hunter-Class Frigate program. A tour of the work was definitely a highlight, putting the size of the project into perspective. Students got to see first-hand the size of the vessels being built and the magnitude of the shed infrastructure that houses the initial manufacturing process of the ships.

The following day we visited the RAAF Base which for all students was the highlight of the week. Students were able to get a first-hand insight into the robotics, aircraft maintenance, electronic/computing systems and VR technologies that are being prototyped. We also enjoyed lunch in the RAAF Mess which was an experience in itself, as it is a little different to the College canteen.

On the final day we learnt about the physics and mathematics behind the innovation and creativity of many of the DSTG projects, including how these discoveries soon become embedded into our daily lives. Other sessions ranged from learning about deepfake and how vigilant we need to be especially with regard to facial recognition to hearing the career – life journeys of many people who work at DSTG.

This week was transformative and opened our eyes to opportunities that students may not have considered previously.
